# Making Student Learning Assessment Useful and Used

In this interactive workshop, we'll talk about some of the key reasons why assessment may or may not be used, including organizational and

governance structures, incentives for change, professional development, standards for student performance, how assessment results are shared, curriculum design, the assessments themselves, and the learning outcomes on which the assessments are based. Brief presentations will be interspersed with discussions, exercises, and opportunities to brainstorm strategies to try at your own college.

Below are some specific strategies that will be discussed throughout the workshop:

- The clearer your goals, the more useful your results.
- If you're not teaching it, you can't improve student achievement of it.
- Assessments that are well designed and clearly written are more likely to yield useful results.
- Results are more useful when you have a clear sense of your standards: what level of performance is good enough.
- Faculty can more easily use assessment results to improve teaching and learning when they're familiar with recent research on what helps college students learn.
- Simple, user-friendly reports on results are more likely to be used than long, obtuse
  ones.
- Results are used when there are processes in place to make sure the right people discuss
  the results and their implications--not only for individual classes but for curriculum
  design, support services, resources, and institutional priorities.
